- Dog is left alone regularly for more than 4 hours or when left for any time displays signs of distress
- Dogs work and social behaviours are rarely reinforced using positive methods and punishment is often used
- Dogs showing signs of behavioural changes which dogs handler is unaware of
- Dog does not interact with environment or human/animal family members and/or is withdrawn
- Dog is regularly showing signs of stress in working situations and often chooses not to perform a working task
- Dog's choice and opportunity to perform natural behaviours is regularly restricted when not working

- Socially dog generally interacts with the environment & human/animal family members but occasionally displays signs of withdrawal
- Dog is occasionally showing signs of stress in working situations, and occasionally chooses not to perform working tasks
- Dog's choice and opportunity to perform natural behaviours is occasionally restricted when not working

- Toys are provided which are safe, appropriate and regularly rotated to encourage novelty
- Dog is provided with a 'safe haven' and provided with opportunities to rest undisturbed
- Where there are other pets in the household they interact appropriately
- Dog has daily opportunity for interactive play/enrichment in a safe outdoor space/garden and is free run several times a week in a variety of locations.
- Dog is not left alone for more than 4 hours in any 24- hour period and is relaxed when left
- Dogs work and social behaviours are reinforced using only positive reinforcement methods
- Dogs over 7 years, the dogs handler is aware of aging process and is observant for signs of changes in behaviour
- Socially dog is relaxed and interacts positively with environment & human/animal family members
- Dog appears physically and mentally comfortable while working, and does not show any signs of stress. Always performs working tasks.
- Dog is given choice and opportunity to perform natural behaviours when not working

Positive mental experiences

Our dogs have the right to experience overall mental wellbeing

Welfare Aim:

Promote various forms of comfort, pleasure, interest, confidence and a sense of control

- The dog frequently encounters negative experiences in nutrition, physical health, environment or behavioural interactions
- The dogs' handler does not counteract unavoidable negative experiences and increase positive experiences
- The demands of the dog's role cause inappropriate and unmanaged levels of stress or anxiety
- The dog encounters some negative experience in nutrition, physical health, environment or behavioural interactions
- The dogs' handler requires support to understand how to counteract unavoidable negative experiences and increase positive experiences
- The demands of the dog's role results in the dog being placed under some stress or anxiety which must be managed
- The dog encounters positive experience in nutrition, physical health, environment and behavioural interactions
- The dogs' handler counteracts unavoidable negative experiences and increase positive experiences as much as possible
- Enrichment is a part of every day
- Dog has sufficient rest and recreation and time to 'be a dog'
- Dog is provided with opportunities for choice

Considering the descriptors above an overall score can be applied to capture the dogs state of wellbeing enabling decisions to be made regarding the most appropriate course of action as may be required.
