PTSD service dogs play an important role in helping veterans reconnect with their community and become more independent. 100% of clients report that their Service Dog contributed to their ability to go on public outings.

Before receiving their service dog:

28.57% of clients did not go out (into public)

42.86% of clients went out less than once/week

After receiving their service dog:

46.43% went out more than once per week

NATIONAL SERVICE DOGS

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PRESIDENT AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

2021 marked the 25th anniversary of National Service Dogs' transformational work to empower people to achieve their full potential with strategically trained and certified service and facility dogs, catalysts for restorative change. During those 25 years we have loved over 842 dogs including 324 autism Service dogs, 59 PTSD service dogs, 30 canine-assisted intervention dogs, 10 assorted guide, skills and hearing dogs, 157 Skilled Companion Dogs and 262 Very Important Pets; including 54 retired breeding dogs.

Throughout 2021 our 17 staff and 275 volunteers welcomed 14 new teams to the National Service Dogs' family. In our recent graduate survey, our active graduates gave NSD a combined score of 4.6/5 on program delivery and dog performance.

NSD's Board of Directors focused on key governance tasks including financial and policy oversight, director recruitment, risk management and executive director performance oversight. In the fall an inperson strategic planning session was held to validate NSD's "Vision 2022" strategic plan and set out our "Vision 2025" goals. "National Service Dogs is financially strong and I know the Board of Directors is well-equipped to lead National Service Dogs forward. On behalf of the Board, I extend a heartfelt thank you to our Executive Director and Founder, Danielle Forbes, for bravely creating and leading the organization through so many highs and lows over the past 25 years!" 2021 was a year like none other before it and in spite of all of the challenges put in front of the team, National Service Dogs not only survived but thrived, always focused on our vision to be Canada's premier service dog provider, pioneering change in the lives of Canadians benefiting from our services.

NSD's future is bright. 2022 has already seen the soft launch of the long-anticipated NSD Education Centre, 8 life changers deployed with their new handlers and 59 dogs in various stages of development.

Thank you to our dedicated staff, past, present and future, who make the magic possible.

Thank you to our volunteers for your unwavering dedication.

Thank you to our donors for being passionate about our vision and helping make it a reality.



2021 AT A GLANCE





OUR IMPACT

At National Service Dogs everything we do is geared toward empowering people through our life-changing dogs. Our Autism Service Dog, PTSD Service Dog, Skilled Companion Dog and Canine Assisted Intervention Dog programs allow us to impact the lives of a diverse group of Canadians.

Certified Service Dogs for Autism increase safety levels, improve socialization, help suppress behavioural outbursts, assist with transitions and provide children with unconditional love and friendship.

Certified Service Dogs for PTSD promote Integration and Activity, suppress Hyper Vigilance and provide Reality Affirmation and Redirection. Through grounding nudges, the creation of more personal space and alerting and assisting with nightmares, PTSD service dogs help individuals create positive daily routines and help them re-engage with their families and communities.

Certified Facility Dogs – Canine Assisted Interventions are currently deployed in three sectors; education, justice and peer support within the first responder community. Together with their skilled, professional handlers, facility dogs dramatically impact the mental health, well-being and level of engagement with programs and communities for the individuals they support.

Skilled Companion Dogs help to decrease stress and anxiety, increase psychological well-being, increase opportunities for exercise, and increase opportunities for social interaction, not just for the children they are matched with but for the entire family. Although skilled companion dogs may not be certified for public access, their impact on the children and families they support can be just as profound and empowering.



THE NUMBERS

The challenges faced by NSD's training team in 2020 were unprecedented but provided the opportunity for NSD to reimagine how we deliver on our programs and were the catalyst for the development of virtual learning and follow-up processes. These program modifications served us well as we continued to respond to COVID-related challenges in 2021. Despite shutdowns and training delays we are proud of our community for coming together to work through these challenges and together we matched 9 service dog teams, 3 canine-assisted intervention teams and 2 skilled companion dog teams. NSD welcomed 37 new puppies into the program in 2021. We are very grateful for the volunteers who came on board to foster new puppies over the course of the year even though in-person puppy training classes were not always possible. The continued perseverance of the staff and volunteer community was an inspiration as we celebrated our 25th Anniversary. We wish to thank the NSD family of staff, volunteers and donors for making 2021 a success.



OUR TEAMS



Certified Autism Service Dog - NSD Friday

"Bringing NSD Friday home to meet Liam this past April 2021, was undoubtedly the most anticipated event in our lives in the last 6 years. In all honesty, our family's excitement and hope that Friday could reach Liam in a way that no one else had to date was so high. Thankfully Friday has met, and promises to exceed our expectations in regard to bringing a new level of growth to Liam's daily routine and life in general. While the initial weeks were rough - there is no other way to say it when you have a new family member that has to go everywhere you go even when you don't want company- the bond between Liam and Friday becomes stronger the more time passes and the more we include her in our activities. It's been nothing short of heartwarming to watch the change in Liam's attitude toward Friday in the five months since she joined our family."

Facility Dogs - NSD Nacho &NSD Quessa

"On a daily basis our dogs (Nacho and Quessa) have been used in various ways to address emotional well-being. It never ceases to amaze me how efficiently a dog can rapidly de-escalate volatile, dysregulated behaviour and enable a student to quickly calm their body and mind and, thereby, move on to address a situation/problem positively and productively. We describe it as "flipping a switch" in a child. I have seen children aggressively kicking, screaming, knocking furniture and then, in the presence of a dog, instantly cease their volatility and/or aggression. It may sound too good to be true, but this scenario has played out over and over again in the time we have had the dogs in the school. This has resulted in children being sent home far less often."






Skilled Companion Dog - NSD Laddie

DONOR ACCOUNTABILITY



Each year thousands of individual donors make direct contributions to NSD's programs and we are incredibly grateful for their support. In 2021, we were honoured to be the recipient of several major legacy gifts. Legacy gifts give NSD the confidence to build out our infrastructure and strengthen and grow our programs. In 2022, we will leverage these generous gifts to acquire additional space for the new NSD Education Centre in Kitchener, Ontario. The Education Centre will be the hub of NSD's daily doggie activities and the deployment of service and facility dogs across Canada. The additional space will also make NSD more accessible to members of our community and allow us to capitalize on our team's expertise and capacity to deliver pet first aid courses, mental health and suicide interventions training and community education around mental health, accessibility, PTSD and autism.

In response to continuing COVID-19 challenges, NSD launched a new signature event in 2021, Paws in Motion. This event encouraged participants to get out into their communities and move as they choose, track their kilometres and raise money in support of NSD's mission. Participants from across Canada came together and raised \$38,605 in our inaugural year! We are excited to build on this as we plan for the Paws in Motion event in 2022.




DONOR ACCOUNTABILITY

Breeder Caretaker

Volunteers care for a breeder including transportation to appointments and possibly whelping a litter of puppies.

Puppy Raiser

Volunteers provide basic obedience and socialization training for NSD puppies from approximately eight weeks of age to 14 -16 months of age.

Adult Raiser

Volunteers fine-tune skills and continue socialization training for NSD dogs from approximately 14 - 16 months of age until they find their forever family.

Puppy Sitter

Volunteers support our raisers by caring for dogs when they are on vacation or need a break.

Doggy Carpool Driver

Volunteers transport dogs from adult raiser homes to the NSD training centre.

Administrative Support

Volunteers assist with tax receipting, filing, mailouts, and other administrative duties.

Events/Fundraising

Volunteers work with NSD staff to help ensure the success of various fundraising events.

Property Maintenance

Volunteers assist with general painting and repairs, electrical and plumbing work, lawn mowing, and gardening.




LOOKING FORWARD
