In 2011, NSD became the first ADI accredited service dog organization in Canada to launch a PTSD Service Dog Program to assist veterans and first responders with long term Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder. Certified Service Dogs for PTSD ground their partners in reality, assist them with sleep routines and help them to reconnect with their families and re-engage in activities of daily living.

NSD graduates Sean and Neville hit the ground running in May 2018 as they embarked on a vacation to Newfoundland shortly after they were matched. According to Sean, "The main thing is, he keeps me grounded." If Neville sees Sean leaning over with his elbows on his knees. Neville will come over and give him a nudge, helping to keep him grounded in reality and redirecting him to more positive thoughts and activities. Nightmare interruption is an integral part of his role and he gently wakes Sean when he's having a bad dream or provides deep pressure and a reassuring presence if Sean is restless at night.

Through 2018 we took the time we needed to reflect on NSD's organizational structure and made changes to our Client Service and Puppy Development Program and as we move forward we will continue this process in order to strengthen NSD's core infrastructure and capacity to service our existing and future clients.

NSD is commitmed to excellence, transparency and good governance and through the re-accreditation process with both Assistance Dogs International and Imagine Canada our hard work was reaffirmed by both agencies.

We continue to evaluate opportunities to enhance our programs and have committed to strengthening our breeding program over the coming year by joining the ABC Breeding Cooperative through Assistance Dogs International. Additionally, we are committed to the ongoing training of our team of professionals who are certified in mental health first aid and re-certified in CPR and first aid this year. NSD staff have also received training in Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST), interview skills training and trauma in order to give them the tools they need to support our clients, volunteers and their own self-care.

With the help of nearly 4000 stakeholders; including donors, volunteers and staff, we are able to provide life changing Service and Facility Dogs at no charge to the individuals, families and agencies that rely on them every day. To everyone who gives so generously of their time and money we wish to thank you for being part of our journey to restore hope and empower people to live their lives to the fullest.


Certified Service Dogs for Autism increase safety levels, improve socialization, help suppress behavioural outburst, assist with transitions and provide children with unconditional love and friendship.

Through grounding nudges, the creation of more personal space and alerting and assisting with nightmares, PTSD Service Dogs help individuals create positive daily routines and help them re-engage with their families and communities.

CAI Dogs are matched with treatment professionals from a variety of
disciplines to work as partners in therapy to address Health and
Wellness in communities across Canada. The opportunities to integrate
CAI Dogs into a variety of treatment plans are numerous, from mental
health, addictions, literacy, physical therapy and more.

Companion Dogs


National Service Dogs recognizes the special bonds that develop between dogs and their families. The therapeutic value of pets is well documented and many people have experienced decreased stress and anxiety, increased psychological well being, increased opportunities for exercise, and increased opportunities for social interaction. Our Companion Dogs may not be certified for public access, but their impact on the children they support can be just as profound and empowering.



THE NUMBERS

A total of 61 dogs entered Advanced Training in 2018. 21 graduated as Certified Service Dogs, 3 Canine Assisted Intervention, 15 were designated Companion Dogs and 22 were released into our Career Change program.

Our world-class breeding program produced seven litters of puppies, a grand total of 42 puppies, Dogs are bred for the temperament and physicality necessary to be accredited working dogs.






OUR TEAMS

Lukas and NSD Corby, 2018 Autism Dog Graduates








VOLUNTEER IMPACT
