2020

In 2020, we added Fire Team K-9 to our Service Dog Provider team due to Ontario Command's partnership. Together, we met the challenges posed by the pandemic and have witnessed a maturing and expanding program benefiting Ontario's Veterans.

2021

A commitment to ongoing semiannual Service Dog conferences resulted in all programs committing to pursue ADI accreditation. Our two senior SD Providers, VICD and NSD, will mentor the other providers. This is a positive development that raises the bar on standardization, provides international mobility to SD pairings, and provides additional program development mentoring along with increased professional accountability.

ONGOING

Three providers in Ontario are progressing towards program maturity and the following shared values:

1. Client-Centred, Continuity of Care:

Our program is committed to ongoing collaboration with clients and mental health professionals and includes a detailed set of WWC prescriber guidelines, regular team followups and recertifications, and a successor dog process.

2. Ethical Canine Care:

Our dogs are the heart of OP Service Dog. We prioritize all facets of animal welfare and wellbeing including ethical training, screening, and deployment processes.

3. Ongoing Collaboration and Education:

Collaboration and cooperation between member programs ensures the best possible outcomes for clients and service dog teams, strengthens client advocacy, community education, and cultural competency, and supports positive outcomes.
